To the forefront of our recent thoughts has been the tragedies experienced in Paris, which have shocked the French Nation, and all those who value Freedoms in the World's Democracies.

In the Centenary Years of the Great War, and 75 years since the Fall of France to the onslaught of 'Nazi Germany' Forces, there is poignancy in the rallying call Vers la Paix Universelle!

From 1904 the *Entente Cordiale* has certainly had ups & downs, yet has survived to stand shoulder-to-shoulder in dark times! In the exodus of refugees from the Low Countries and France in 1940, Poole played a significant role, as did young BOAC. One remarkable arrivée via Gibraltar was M. Jacques Hazard, who boarded the French ship L'Anadyr on the 2nd. July 1940 arriving in the UK on the 7th., to be transferred from London to the camp at Odiham where refugee fliers gathered together.


Ordered in 1927, the French Navy commissioned the *Surcouf* in 1934 as an underwater cruiser, the largest submarine built prewar 110m in length, propelled by diesels + electric motors. Besides being equipped with torpedoes & twin powerful guns there was one Marcel Besson MB.411 Seaplane called *Petrel*. With the collapse of France, *Surcouf* escaped from a shipyard at Brest where a refit was underway, and made it to Plymouth.



From Odiham he was posted to *Surcouf* as the seaplane pilot: In the Winter of 1940 *Surcouf* was at Poole, when *Jacques* and *Petrel* were detached to *RNAS Sandbanks* for further training. *There was never a reunion as Surcouf was lost in Feb. 1942!*



After our action against the French Fleets to stop them falling into *enemy hands*, the French ships in the UK were boarded. This resulted in certain hostility and some serious incidents! Eventually with an option to either stay, or return to France, vacancies occurred within the crew of 8 Officers + 110 men. Amongst the replacements was Jacques Hazard as the pilot designated to fly the *Petrel* brought out of its compartment! Jacques was a confident flier who'd flown since 16 years old and had enlisted in 1939. He had been sent to Flying School in Oran(Algeria) before he escaped with two friends in 1940. They ditched in Spain before crossing the border to Gibraltar.

Jacques returned to Plymouth by May 1941 & was detached to Mount Batten, soon *Petrel* was scrapped as unrepairable: Jacques opted to join with his comrades on RAAF 10 Sqdn... He became the only Frenchman to serve with the Australians:

From Fight Sergeant June 1941 to Warrant Off., then Pilot Off. in 1942 *aka* a *Sous-Lieutenant*.

He was Pilot Officer on RB-W W3993 which attacked + badly damaged U-105 on 11.06.1942.

On 21.06.1942, whilst on ASR, *RB-Y* was attacked by an Arado 196 Seaplane and forced down, ~ landing sighted by a Whitley from 58 Sqd. at 48'20N 08'07W in Biscay...with an explosion!

When *RB-Y* sank there was no evidence at all of any survivors.

This had been his 59th. Mission with 700 hours of flying time!



What might Jacques have achieved in postwar France if he had survived the war?

Flt Lt Judell, FO Hazard, PO Chataway, PO Gilbert, Sgt. Benison, AC Dorney, Sgt. Taylor, Sgt. McClean, LAC Willis, LAC Tipping, and Sgt. Winterflood ...lost on ASR for a Wellington of 172 Sqdn
